COLD WEATHER SHELTERS

The cold weather shelters will be the same this year:

- Community Christ Church located at 2111 Presidio Street, Navarre 292-2055
- Ferris Hill Baptist Church located at 6848 Chaffin Street, Milton 623-3500

The shelters will open each night when weather is forecasted to drop below 40 degrees, December through March. The churches with the assistance of the Santa Rosa County Emergency Management Office, will be responsible for making the determination of when the shelter is needed. Santa Rosa County Emergency Management is responsible for notifying the public of its availability and alerting sheriff deputies so they can assist with transportation and notifying the homeless of the shelter's availability.

The shelter is for people who can care for themselves and are not at risk to themselves or others. No one will be admitted to the shelter that is under the influence of drugs or alcohol and are unable to walk unaided or are disoriented. Those who would like to stay at the shelter must arrive between 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. No one will be admitted after 8:30 p.m. unless brought in by law enforcement. The shelter will close at 7 a.m. each morning.

BBB TUESDAY TIPS - HOLIDAY TIPS FOR TRAVELERS

Business Brief: Yellow Page scams targeting businesses reappear

BBB is warning of the latest Yellow Pages scam. One operation appears to be located in Vermont - [Business Solutions Online](#), and three other operations are located in Massachusetts - [Open Business Directory Limited](#), [Official Yellow Guide Inc.](#), and [Yellow Page Solutions](#). Businesses throughout the country report receiving fraudulent invoices from these operations for unauthorized online advertising.

The operations in Massachusetts and Vermont have had several complaints filed against them by businesses regarding billing or advertising issues. Business Solutions Online now appears to be out of business and has received 77 complaints in the last three years.

Open Business Directory Ltd. is located in Boston, Massachusetts and is also known as [Yellowpageusa.com](#). They have an F Rating with BBB, as well as 76 complaints, only three of which were resolved. Official Yellow Guide Inc. is also based in Boston, Massachusetts, with a BBB Rating of F. There are 9 unanswered complaints against this operation. They are known under several other names, including Yellow Business Directory, and American Yellow Directory.

Yellow Page Solutions is located in Woburn, Massachusetts. Businesses state that Yellow Page Solutions sent them invoices for online advertising that were never agreed to. When confronting the operation about the unauthorized charges, businesses report that Yellow Page Solutions claim that a verbal contract was agreed to and if the past due amount is not paid, the business will be sent to collections.

In several cases, when businesses file a complaint with BBB against Business Solutions Online or Yellow Page Solutions, their desired settlement is a zero balance on their account. When BBB contacts these operations regarding the complaint, they state that they have audio taped receipts for the online advertising services. Upon review of the audio, the operation claims there was a 'misunderstanding' and agrees to terminate all fees, as well as to remove information about the business from their database.

Because these types of scams operate under a variety of different names, BBB offers the following tips for businesses that receive Yellow Page solicitations or invoices:

- Look over each bill closely before paying it. If you have a question about the legitimacy of your bill, contact your Yellow Pages representative.
- Channel all invoices through one department and make sure they are cleared with the appropriate executives before they are paid.
- Check the BBB Business Review on any business that has contacted you before signing anything or giving out any payments or information.

If you believe you have received a call, fax or mailing from a bogus Yellow Pages entity, file a complaint with BBB. You can also contact the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, the Federal Trade Commission or the Yellow Page Association.

Consumer Corner: Traveling for the holidays?

Every year, holiday travelers take to the skies and ride the rails, but most hit the highways. Your BBB offers some tips to stay safe on the road this holiday season.

Your BBB recommends the following tips for stay safe driving this holiday season:

- **Create a car safety kit.** Holiday driving may include the threat of dangerous winter weather. Snow and ice lead to accidents, especially for Florida residents who may not be used to such driving conditions. Prepare for bad weather by creating a safety kit that includes a blanket, flashlight with extra batteries, radio, first aid kit, jumper cables, non-perishable foods like granola bars and nuts, bottled water, and ice scraper and warm gloves.
- **Take the car in for a checkup.** Breaking down on the side of the road can definitely put a damper on the holiday spirit! Take your car in for a checkup before making the trip. At the very least, check the car's fluid levels, wipers and tires. If you plan on driving through serious winter weather, consider getting snow tires.
- **Take your BBB with you.** When you're away from home or in the midst of an emergency, it's hard to know which businesses – such as tow trucks and locksmiths – you can trust. BBB's [free iphone app](#) and our [mobile-optimized website](#) can help you find businesses you can trust when you're away from your computer.
- **Start early and slow down.** The best way to fight holiday traffic is to give yourself extra time to make the trip and don't speed. Speeding leads to accidents and traffic tickets, both which delay your trip even more. Anticipate delays and schedule appropriately.
- **Drop the distractions.** According to the National Safety Council, 28 percent of accidents happen when people are talking on their cell phones or sending text messages. When you're behind the wheel, don't send or read text messages, use a hands-free headset when talking on the phone and have someone else fumble with the GPS.

RX DRUG ABUSE IN FLORIDA

An Epidemic of Deaths

Stories are all over the evening news and morning talk shows about the abuse of prescription drugs and the important thing to remember in almost all of these cases is that they start from innocence. Some people become addicted to these drugs under the false belief that taking a drug that is legally prescribed, even if it is not prescribed to them, is safe because it is a legally prescribed drug and many others become addicted after having the drug prescribed to them for a legitimate illness or injury.

Here are some startling facts about prescription drug abuse in Florida. It is time we all take a look at what is inside our medicine cabinets and get rid of what we do not need.

_ An average of 7 persons die every day in Florida because of lethal overdoses from the illegal, non-medical misuse of one or more prescription drugs.

_ An additional 7 persons die daily with at least one prescription drug detected often in combination with alcohol or other drugs. That is a total of 14 deaths per day in Florida related to prescription drug abuse.

- _ 5,275 persons died in Florida, during 2009 and another 2,579 in the first half of 2010 with at least one prescription drug in their system identified as either the cause of death or present in the decedent.
- _ Most of these deaths were preventable.
- _ Treatment admissions for prescription opioid (pain relievers) addiction increased 5½ times in Florida over the past decade. Among those aged 12 to 30, the number of prescription opioid treatment clients rose from 488 in 1999 to 7,649 in 2009, a 1,467-percent increase.
- _ The rate of hospital emergency department cases for non-medical oxycodone misuse among those aged 21-25 has greatly increased.
- _ Florida leads the nation in the sale of oxycodone with over 400,000,000 pills sold annually.
- _ Benzodiazepines (e.g., Xanax, Klonopin, Valium) and muscle relaxants (e.g., Soma) are also frequently linked to overdose deaths and medical emergencies across Florida.
- _ Among Florida 12th graders in 2010, 11 % have misused a prescription pain reliever non-medically in their life; 3.4 % have done so in the last month.
- _ The number of infants treated for withdrawal symptoms in Florida hospitals increased 173% between 2006 and 2009; 635 cases were reported in the first half of 2010.

SANTA ROSA FLOOD RATING IMPROVES TO A CLASS 5

-County Mitigation Efforts Save Property Owners \$1.1 Million Annually-

Santa Rosa County's Community Rating System or CRS, has improved from a Class 6 to a Class 5 in the National Flood Insurance Program. The improvement can mean up to a 25 percent discount for residents in the premium cost of flood insurance for NFIP policies. Santa Rosa is one of only 13 communities in the state of Florida to be awarded the Class 5 designation. There are no other communities in Florida with a higher CRS rating, and only nine in the nation have earned a higher rating. The reduction is expected to save property owners county-wide an additional estimated \$219,680 annually. With the increased discounts, property owners in Santa Rosa County now save a combined \$1.1 million each year on flood insurance premiums.

The activity that most significantly accounted for the classification improvement was the development of the Santa Rosa County Multi-Jurisdictional Flood Mitigation Plan adopted in February, which scored higher than any previous flood mitigation plan in the history of the CRS program nationwide. The plan was developed by the Santa Rosa County Flood Mitigation Task Force, a group composed of a broad spectrum of community stakeholders and county staff, with the assistance of CRS Max Consultants, Inc. The task force conducted meetings for six months analyzing and evaluating the community's flood hazard and making a variety of recommendations to mitigate the hazard.

The class improvement results in a 25 percent flood insurance reduction for flood insurance policy holders in the special flood hazard areas of unincorporated Santa Rosa County issued on

or after October 1, an average savings of \$51 per year. Homeowners should contact their insurance provider or Santa Rosa County Floodplain Manager Karen Thornhill at (850) 981-7029 to find out if they qualify for the discount. Residents can also check their flood zone classification online at www.santarosa.fl.gov/gis by selecting "Interactive GIS Mapping System." Once in the mapping program, enter the home's address and select "flood zones" under the map layer tab to view the letter classification rating.

FEMA established CRS two decades ago as a means of reducing the cost for damage from floods, the one hazard that consistently ranks highest in property damage throughout the nation. By rewarding communities that actively work to mitigate, or reduce, the flood hazard costs through varied activities ranging from code revisions, to storm water drainage projects, to community education, FEMA is able to encourage communities to be "flood smart." The reward comes in the form of reductions in flood insurance premiums. A local government that is particularly proactive in reducing the flood hazard in its community actually returns money to its residents and businesses through flood insurance rate reductions. Brad Loar, FEMA, Region IV, Mitigation Division Director is expected to make a presentation on the improvements to the board of county commissioners in December or January

Use of barricades policy: Free to parades in Santa Rosa County that are sponsored by a chambers or government entities (Christmas parades, Mardi Gras, 4th of July etc...) that are free and open to the public, with the understanding that the user is responsible for transportation of barricades, AND banners advertizing sponsors MUST be put on barricades. Others wanting to use the barricades must provide transportation and rent barricades at a cost of \$5 per barricade. Additional fees may be applicable if barricades are not returned within 7 days of pick up. Barricades will cost \$9 each if delivery is required. Average rental price for barricades is \$9-\$13 each through other vendors. SAFER barricades are a bargain.

Hazardous Materials Advanced Radiological Response Training
Santa Rosa County EOC

December 6, 2011 8:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m.

Sponsored By: Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) District 1

Program Description: Radiological training for first responders that augments HazMat Technician Level training. Students will learn basic terminology and units, survey instruments and devices to detect radioactive materials, as well as actions, tactics and strategies for response, and exhibit these proficiencies with hands-on proficiency stations/drills.

Instructor: Mr. Hector Tabares and Mr. David Pieski are employed by the Florida Department of Health Bureau of Radiation Control and serve as Radiological and WMD Trainers. They design and deliver presentations and training to county health departments, hospitals, and first responders to deal with radiological incidents. They are both certified by FEMA and the U.S. Department of Energy.

MGT348 - MEDICAL PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE TO BOMBING INCIDENTS - 16.00 HOURS

Prerequisites - None, recommended familiarity with the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS) via completion of FEMA independent study courses IS-100, IS-200, and IS-700 (or their equivalents).

Description - This course addresses medical preparedness for and response to blast effects through a combination of lectures, small group activities and tabletop participant exercises. Participants completing this course will gain an enhanced understanding and awareness of issues and considerations relating to a bombing incident. Content areas include identification of targets, explosives characteristics, pre-attack indicators, pre- and post-detonation response, bombing injuries, security, and resource management.

Topics

- Identification of Potential Terrorist Threats and Targets
- Explosives and Characteristics
- Pre-Attack Indicators of a Bombing Incident
- Pre-Detonation Response-Preventive, Preparatory, and Response Actions
- Post-Detonation Response-Field Scene Exercises/Triage
- Bombing Incident Injury Patterns and Treatment
- Post-Detonation Response-Bombing Incident Scene Safety and Security
- Resource Management for Bombing Incidents
- Integrating Exercise

Audience - The course development team identified the primary audience for this course as first receivers and first responders. This group consists of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel and health care personnel such as nurses and physicians (particularly those who staff emergency rooms), trauma surgeons, and emergency managers. The secondary audience includes all other disciplines that may be involved in the medical response to an explosive incident, such as fire service, law enforcement, public works, and public health personnel

Course Size Minimum of 32 participants Maximum of 50 participants
